EMERALD AWARD

The Broward County Commission presented the Town with a 2015 Emerald Award in March for its work in planting sea oats along its beach. The mosaic award will be placed in the garden in front of Town Hall for the public to see. The NatureScope award recognized the Town for its efforts and ongoing commitment to help protect the environment.

NO EASTER BUNNY

The Town will not hold its Easter-by-The-Sea event in April. An Easter Egg Hunt is normally held the day before Easter, but the Town opted not to do it this year.

Tax rate now third lowest in Broward!

The **Town of Lauderdale-By-The-Sea** now has the **third lowest property tax rate** among all 31 cities in Broward County, and the **second lowest Fire Assessment fee**.

Our tax rate went from fourth place in 2014 to third place this year when the **Town Commission** lowered the rate from **\$3.9312** to **\$3.8000** per thousand dollars of taxable property value. The Town took over the third lowest tax rate ranking from **Lighthouse Point**, which lowered its tax rate in 2015 from \$3.8307 to \$3.8175. All tax rates mentioned here and on Page 5 include debt service. The Town has no debt whatsoever.

Lauderdale-By-The-Sea's tax rate is also lower than our closest municipal neighbors. The **Village of Sea Ranch Lakes'** tax rate is \$7.5000, which ranked **No. 25** among Broward's 31 cities. **Pompano Beach** is ranked **No. 11** with \$5.2470. Fort Lauderdale ranked **No. 7** with \$4.3151.

The Town's residential Fire Assessment fee of \$123.50 is the second lowest in Broward County. Lighthouse Point is the only city with a lower fee.

One of the Town's key strategic goals is to keep our millage rate and Fire Assessment Fee in the lowest quartile of all the cities in Broward County and we are surpassing that goal.

Town starts coral restoration project with NSU

As part of its continuing efforts to preserve and expand our coral reefs, the Town has contracted with **Nova Southeastern University's Oceanographic Center** to plant **2,000 staghorn corals** off the Town's coast.

Staghorn coral provides critical habitat for numerous tropical fish and other marine species. A fast growing coral, its branches can increase 4 to 8 inches per year and can grow into dense thickets 100 feet or more in length.

An important reef-building coral, staghorn was listed as threatened by **NOAA** in 2006. It was the first time any coral species was listed as threatened under the **Endangered Species Act**. Healthy coral reefs help provide critical shoreline protection for many coastal communities.

NSU's Oceanographic Center in Dania Beach, a nationally-known research center for reef conservation, has a **Coral Nursery Initiative** program where corals are nurtured offshore and then out-planted elsewhere to help replenish South Florida's staghorn coral population.

Deputy Friedrich retires after serving 27 years in the Town

Broward Sheriff's Office Deputy Jason Friedrich recently said goodbye to the **Town of Lauderdale-By-The-Sea**.

Friedrich began his law enforcement career with the **Lauderdale-By-The-Sea Police Department** in October 1988 and stayed on with the **Broward Sheriff's Office** when the Town switched from its own department over to BSO in April 2001. He retired in February.

"Anytime you have someone that has an historical perspective on the Town's law enforcement for almost three decades, it is a valuable asset," said **BSO Capt. Fred Wood**, the Town's police chief. "Jason's ability to provide me with that insight and his knowledge of traffic issues will be sorely missed."

A motorcycle officer, Friedrich was a familiar presence to residents and business owners alike. Over the years, he received numerous awards, praise and thanks from the **Town Commission**, **LBTS Police Department**, residents and his BSO supervisors. A Fort Lauderdale native, Friedrich entered the **Broward Police Academy** after graduating from **Fort Lauderdale High School**. He completed BSO's motorcycle training in April 1995 and was assigned to BSO's LBTS motorcycle unit the next month. He moved over to regular patrol in 2012.

In one of his more notable actions as a motorcycle deputy, Friedrich was patrolling State Road A1A in May 2010 when he spotted a speeding southbound vehicle occupied by two dangerous criminals fleeing the scene of a prescription drug-related murder in Pompano Beach. Friedrich stopped the vehicle in the 1900 block of A1A, apprehended the driver and immediately called for back-up as the passenger in the vehicle fled. The fleeing suspect was soon caught and arrested after BSO set-up a perimeter in the area.

Friedrich was presented with a plaque at a **Town Commission** meeting for his bravery in apprehending the suspects.

Volunteer Fire Department receives higher ISO rating

The **Town of Lauderdale-By-The-Sea's** fire protection rating improved this year following an evaluation of the **Volunteer Fire Department** by the **Insurance Services Office**, an independent firm that assesses fire protection risks for cities and insurance companies nationwide.

The VFD received a **Class 2 rating**, the highest ever in department history. Class 1 is the highest score; 10 is the lowest. In Florida, only about 40 fire departments out of more than 680 are rated Class 2. Nationwide, only 1.5 percent of all fire departments are rated Class 2.

"We were able to improve our rating by increasing our training and improving our training documentation in addition to the implementation of new fire prevention requirements," **Fire Chief Judson Hopping** said.

A community's ISO ranking, which reflects ISO's fire risk evaluation, primarily affects the casualty fire insurance premiums companies charge to businesses.

It is difficult to know precisely how a change in a community's rating will affect a business owner's insurance premiums, since some companies base their insurance premiums on banded ISO ranges, such as 1 to 3 or 4 to 7.

ISO uses well-defined criteria to review a community's firefighting capabilities. Fire departments are evaluated on fire alarm and communication systems, fire apparatus and equipment, pump testing, training, the number of firefighters on duty, emergency response and station locations, pre-emergency planning, fire hydrant testing, and the water distribution system and capacity.

Step Back In Time

Anglin's Pier. Anglin's Square. Many Town residents say those names often, if not every day.

You can't write the history of Lauderdale-By-The-Sea without talking about Melvin I. Anglin, the man whose association with LBTS dates to 1924, three years before the Town was first incorporated by the Florida Legislature.

Boston developer William Morang arrived before Anglin did, but it was Anglin who stayed and picked up the pieces when Morang disappeared after defaulting on his real estate holdings. A businessman and real estate developer from Gary, Indiana, Anglin owned a sawmill in Madison, Fla. While traveling along the coast one day, he saw more potential in Lauderdale-By-The-Sea, calling it "The best piece of oceanfront property around."

Anglin became the Town's first Mayor in December 1927, only to see the tiny village go bankrupt and revert to unincorporated Broward in 1933. At one point Anglin owned an estimated 90 percent of the property in Town. He later donated the land where Town Hall and Friedt Family Park is today. He built the gas station at Commercial and the pier that bears his name in 1941. Even though he wasn't a fisherman, Anglin realized its potential in attracting tourists and new residents to Town.

The Town incorporated again in 1947. Anglin died in 1949.

Final segment on Commercial coming this summer

The final phase of the Town’s award-winning **Commercial Boulevard Streetscape Project** (the two blocks between Ocean Drive and Seagrape Drive) is under design and construction is expected to start this summer.

It will take less time to complete this phase of the Commercial Boulevard streetscape than the earlier projects because the drainage modifications are minor.




The designers met with local business owners in those two blocks and agreed to maintain visibility to their storefronts and commercial signage.

The project will widen the sidewalks to better accommodate pedestrians and sidewalk dining.

The median will be reduced to a concrete strip to give up space needed to widen the sidewalks and to continue the open vista that exists in the two blocks of Commercial between Ocean Drive and the Beach Pavilion.

Trees and hedges will also be placed along the sidewalks to provide shade and a visual barrier between pedestrians and cars.



FINAL PHASE: Streetscape work will start later this summer on the last two blocks of Commercial Boulevard between State Road A1A and Seagrape Drive, completing the Town’s signature project from the Atlantic Ocean to the Intracoastal Bridge.

The choice of trees and other landscape choices, paving materials and colors, and light fixtures will be the same as those installed between Seagrape and West Tradewinds Avenue to provide continuity.

When this project is finished, the transformation of the streetscape on Commercial Boulevard will be complete and the final phase will mesh well with the streetscape improvements completed in December of 2013.

That widely-acclaimed project recently received a top statewide honor from the **Florida Development Association**, which annually recognizes outstanding urban revitalization projects.

First new hotel coming on El Mar in more than 20 years

On March 10th, the **Town Commission** unanimously approved a site plan for a new hotel project on **El Mar Drive**, the first in Town in more than 20 years.

The **Florida Development Group** plans to construct a new, 34-room boutique hotel with expansive oceanfront balconies and almost 12,000 square feet of open terraces and multiple view corridors to the sea from El Mar Drive. The Charter allows the building to be three stories over a first uninhabitable floor where the glass-fronted lobby will be. Parking will be on site and shielded from view.

The hotel will be built on the site where the **Little Inn**, **Little Inn Too** and **Tropic Ranch** hotels currently stand. Those three hotels, which had a total of 44 rooms combined, were closed by the Town in 2011 for serious fire and building code violations that occurred under the prior owner.

Staff spent months working with the applicant to refine the plan and bring it into compliance with the **Town Charter** and **Code**, an effort that was quite challenging to the developers given the complexities and restrictiveness of our regulations.

In keeping with the Town's designated mid-century modern style of architecture, the hotel will include open air corridors and open stairs with decorative railings, color-highlighted architectural elements on an otherwise white building, stone feature walls at street level, and mid-century

style hotel signage. To acknowledge the mid-century modern aspects of the Little Inn, the **El Mar Ocean Club** will incorporate some color patterns similar to those in the mosaics on the existing building.

The new hotel will feature many improvements over the current buildings on the site, including:

- ◆ Much more extensive and lush landscaping.
- ◆ Four unobstructed view corridors to the ocean from El Mar Drive, where there now are none.
- ◆ Improved drainage.
- ◆ Increased ratio of parking to hotel rooms and parking shielded from view.
- ◆ Elimination of back-out parking onto El Mar Drive.
- ◆ New, widened sidewalks and streetscape improvements in front of the hotel.
- ◆ First class hotel rooms with modern amenities that will command significantly higher room rates.

The pedestrian experience on El Mar Drive along the site will also be greatly improved by the new hotel.

It is a strategic goal of the Town to help the hotel industry remain viable in Lauderdale-by-the-Sea as we consider it integral to the character of the Town.

Construction of the El Mar Ocean Club will help the Town reverse the trend of the last decade in which hotel

NSU obtained a **Florida Fish & Wildlife Commission Special Activity License** to undertake this project with the Town. Work began in late March. Marine biologists from the Center will out-plant corals off Lauderdale-By-The-Sea over the next two years at the following areas, creating separate, high-density sites encompassing a total of 550 square meters:

- ◆ 1,000 feet east of the Town's **Shipwreck Snorkel Trail**.
- ◆ 2,000 feet east and just south of **Washingtonia Park**.
- ◆ Just outside the established perimeter of the **SS Copenhagen** state underwater archaeological preserve, which is located just under a mile off the **Sea Watch Restaurant**.

NSU will outplant corals this spring and next winter, as well as in 2016. Corals are out-planted when water temperatures are somewhat cooler and less stressful to the fragile coral organisms.

Dr. David Gilliam, an assistant professor at NSU, said he was excited to be working with the Town, which allows NSU to continue its vital research to help staghorn recover.

"Coral nurseries have been identified as effective restoration tools," Gilliam said. "It's a proactive tool we can use to help the species recover."

Staghorn corals have been transplanted in the Florida Keys, Hollywood, Fort Lauderdale and other tropical locations worldwide. Lauderdale-By-The-Sea is now the northernmost site on the planet for transplanted staghorn corals! The Town has committed \$59,000 to the project.

rooms were lost and replaced by condos or converted to private residences. (**Buena Vista Hotel**, the last hotel built on El Mar Drive, was constructed in 1994.)

With site plan approval now in hand, the developer will proceed to detailed interior design and the preparation of construction plans. Because the project is located east of the **Coastal Construction Line**, those plan will need to go through a lengthy review process with the **State of Florida**, so it could be next year before ground is broken for the new hotel.

Florida Development Group purchased additional properties in Town and are working on plans to renovate and revitalize the Town's two largest hotels. Site plans for those projects will be coming to the **Planning & Zoning Board** and then the Commission later this Spring and early Summer.
